USA

THUMBS UP

USA – “OK”, “see you later”, or “cool”

Brazil – “Thank you”

Iran – a rude gesture, similar to giving someone the middle finger

Denmark, Finland, and Australia – “excellent”, “great”, and “well”

China – “you’re the best!”

HANDSHAKE

USA, England, Germany, and New Zealand – it's used when meeting or parting and if you know the other person well, you can skip this gesture

France and the rest of Europe – people shake hands even if they know each other well, sometimes even several times a day

Japan – handshakes are considered impolite, people bow instead and the lower they bow the more respect they are showing

3. GESTURES IN JAPAN

4. GESTURE	MEANING
Form a circle with the thumb and index finger of your right hand	Money
Wave your open hand back and forth in front of you, as if you were chasing a mosquito away from your nose	No, none, not, negative, I haven't any, I don't want any
Clench your fist tightly	The sign for someone who is stingy with money

Point to your nose	Me
You are talking about someone and crook your finger at the same time	You are saying that the person is a thief
The little finger pointing straight up in the air	Girlfriend or wife
Extend your right arm and wave the fingers up and down (the fingers are moved while pointing at a slight downward angle)	Come here!
Cross rapidly your two index fingers	Enemies / a quarrel
The thumb rubbed against the side of the nose	A card game called <i>hana</i>
Cupping your hand just below the level of the mouth, with the right hand going through the motions of using chopsticks	Food or eating
Pointing the forefinger at one's ear or temple and making a circular motion with it (anti-clockwise)	Perverse, eccentric, or mentally unstable person
Pointing the forefinger at one's ear or temple and making a circular motion with it (clockwise)	Vanity
If one holds his stiff right hand in front of his face with the palm facing to the left	He is asking indulgence for crossing the path of another or for passing between two persons
The first two fingers tapped lightly against the lips	Kissing
